This is the great battle between Morgoth and the High King of the Noldor, Fingolfin. The story which tells about this fight is called "The Fall of Fingolfin", from which you will be able to tell the outcome. Even though it

is obvious who has the advantage here, Fingolfin gave many cruel wounds to Morgoth and with his dying stroke hewed Morgoth's foot. It was said that Morgoth never walked without a limp again. Also you can see the three Silmarils in the crown of Morgoth, of which Beren and Luthien stole one at a later time.

When Morgoth had beaten Fingolfin, he picked up his body and was about to break it into pieces when the King of the Eagles swooped down and with his talons wounded Morgoth gravely in the face until Morgoth dropped Fingolfin's body in his agony. At that point, the eagle lifted up Fingolfin's body and bore it away, thus Morgoth's revenge on his injuries were not quenched.
