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COURSE DESCRIPTION

American Sign Language (ASL) 205 is the third semester of a two-year long visual language learning for communicative competency in the Deaf Culture. This course focuses on both the comprehension skills development as well as the production of ASL. Six basic categories will be emphasized in the coursework: grammar, vocabulary expansion, facial expression, fingerspelling, production skills and cultural understanding. The student learning outcome for students is to demonstrate their ability to notate ASL in ASL gloss after having received a signed message from the instructor. This SLO will be judged on the final exam.
