BACHELOR OF SCIENCE IN BUSINESS

WAIVEABLE COURSES

BUSB 230 | ECONOMICS FOR BUSINESS (4 units)

Introductory study of macroeconomics and microeconomics. Microeconomics studies decision-making by individual firms and consumers in regard to the allocation of scarce resources, supply and demand basics, and optimum output determination. Macroeconomics includes coverage of the national and global economy, the impact of economic aggregates, and government action.

(Students must take ECON 101 and ECON 202 to waive BUSB 230. Both courses must be passed with a "C" (2.0) or higher.)

BUSB 145 | MATHEMATICAL FOUNDATIONS FOR BUSINESS (4 units)

Introduction of mathematical foundations with applications for decision-making in business, economics, finance, business statistics, and operations management. Focus is on mathematical concepts, including functions and their graphs, systems of equations and inequalities, linear programming, mathematics of finance, and basic probability and statistics.

(Students can take MATH 100 or MATH 110 to waive BUSB 145. Course must be passed with a "C" (2.0) of higher.)

BUSB 232 | BUSINESS STATISTICS (4 units)

Introduction to basic statistical concepts, including measures of central tendency and dispersion, frequency distributions, probability distributions, sampling distributions, and estimation. Also application in statistical inference, one- and two-sample hypothesis testing, chi-square, analysis of variance, and multiple regression models.

(Students can take MATH 120 or PSYC 205 or SOC 205 or BUS 204 to waive BUSB 230. Course must be passed with a "C" (2.0) or higher.)

BUSB 260 | FINANCIAL & MANAGERIAL ACCOUNTING (4 units)

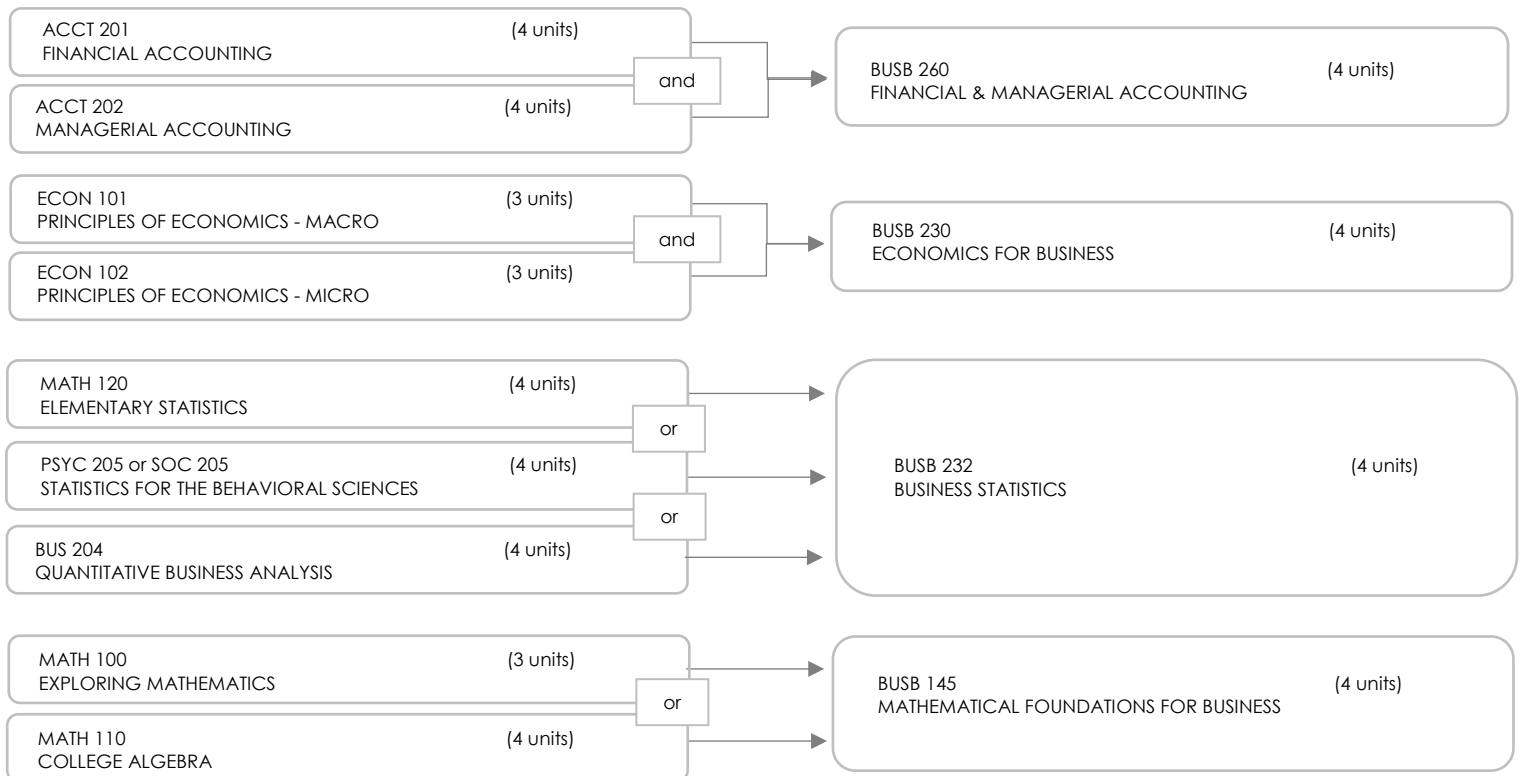
Examines accounting information as an economic decision-making tool. This course presents the concepts, policies and procedures that govern accounting information systems. Students use that understanding to improve resource allocation by managers, owners, and creditors of an organization.

(Students must take both ACCT 201 and ACCT 202 to waive BUSB 260. Both courses must be passed with a "C" (2.0) or higher.)

To graduate from our bachelor's degree programs, you are required to have a certain number of credits in General Education disciplines. Since our students join our programs with different educational histories, we offer flexible requirements and a large variety of options to fulfill them.

WHAT IS THE GENERAL EDUCATION REQUIREMENT?

Students in the University of Redlands School of Business must complete 120 units of semester academic credit with a minimum 2.0 GPA to earn their bachelor's degree. These must include 42 semester credits of General Education. A minimum of 9 of these credits must be earned at the upper-division level. No course can fulfill more than one subject area requirement. You will be assigned a Student Services Manager (SSM) to help you develop a plan to meet these requirements and complete your degree. On the left, you will find examples of areas of transfer credits.

CSU AND UC TRACK COURSES

The University of Redlands generally accepts courses in transfer that are transferable to the California State and University of California systems with a few exceptions (i.e. culinary arts, hospitality services, auto mechanics, cosmetology, welding, air conditioning, clothing construction, and aircraft maintenance technology).

The following disciplines are reviewed with faculty for potential transfer credit on a case-by-case basis: fire technology, radiography, library science, transportation, legal assistant/paralegal, machine shop, fashion design, water supply engineering, water technology education, wastewater technology education, work experience, animal health technology, and agriculture. Additional disciplines that are not similar to University of Redlands course offerings will also be reviewed with faculty as deemed appropriate. Course offerings that are accepted in transfer and are also referenced on the Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC) will generally satisfy either degree or general education requirements at the University of Redlands. Please contact one of our seven locations throughout Southern California for assistance with questions regarding the articulation of courses to satisfy transfer and general education requirements for our undergraduate School of Business program offerings.
