## ESL Information

### **NESL 301, 302, 303 and 304**

- Free, Non-Credit classes.
- Students in ESL levels 1-3 should not be enrolled in classes outside of ESL department.
- Students assessing in this level may include: new immigrants, never attended high school in US.
- Red Flag- Students who attended high school in US and assess at this level may have learning disability.
- Classes meet 10 hours per week Monday-Thursday, 8:30-10:50, 4:30-6:50, and 7:00-9:20.
- A certificate of completion is awarded for student who successfully complete NESL 304 (course can't be repeated after receiving the certificate)

### **ESL 45 and 55 (Fall & Spring only)**

- ESL 45 is a floor level course without prerequisites
- ESL 55 is a prerequisite for ESL 101 and degree applicable
- Students may start taking supplemental ESL classes, and certain classes outside of ESL (Chicano Studies, ROP, Visual and Performing Arts/Studio courses, Bilingual Math 15 during fall, Bilingual Math 50 during spring, and Counseling 110).
- Residency status may affect amount of classes students take per semester.
- These are 5 unit classes that meet 2 days a week (5 hours per week) and focus on reading, writing and vocabulary

### **ESL 40 (Summer only)**

- Good transition course between ESL 55 and 101.

### **ESL 101-103 (Fall & Spring only)**

- Students who are deemed not ready for Eng. 100 after ESL 103 are recommended for Eng. 50.
- Academic writing courses. Credit in Humanities area of AA & CSU General Education.
- 8 UC transferable units for ESL 102 & 103 combined.
- Can enroll in courses outside of ESL.
- Good alternative for 1.5 Generation students to get to English 100.
- Classes meet 5 hours per week MW or TTH

### **Academic Reading ESL 130 & 131 (Fall & Spring only)**

- Alternative to taking Reading 30 and 50 for ESL students.
- CSU transferable credit, and meet 2 day a week for 3 hours per week

### **Career Track ESL 98.1 & 98.2**

- Students focus on reading, writing, and listening and speaking activities, while learning the specialized language used in their selected career area.
- Computer instruction is included: word processing, including graphs and charts, and email.
- VESL Programs: Auto Mechanics, Cosmetology, Electronics, Office Systems, Graphic Communications, Heating/AC/Refrigeration and Dental Assisting
- These are lab classes which meet 10 hours per week Monday-Thursday, 4:30-6:50pm, and 7:00-9:20pm.

### **Other information**

- 1.5 Generation students that assess into English 10 should be advised to take ESL assessment.
- Some high school students are not taking ESL assessment.
- Students with no SSN cannot complete online application.
- There are no self-paced, open-entry, open-exit ESL classes. Student must register during registration period.

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
